To Patricia Wilson of Masury, her infant son is a dream come true.

The doctors had bad news for Trisha, as she is known, two years ago. Back surgery had destroyed her eggs; she could never have children.

But she was determined to become a mom.

Today Trisha, a single mom, cuddles Nathan, to whom she gave birth at St. Elizabeth's in January.

"He's my angel and he will be the only child that I will ever have," says Trisha.

Using her background as a medical technician, Trisha had found a fertility clinic in California.

The doctors implanted in her uterus four embryos, eggs already fertilized, donated by an anonymous couple.

But the eggs had been frozen for 14 years.

Trisha's mother, Tammy, was skeptical any would grow.

"I had never heard of it...it didn't seem to me like it would even be possible," says Tammy Wilson.

Three embryos failed and one took: little Nathan.

"He's starting to find out what his fingers are and his toes...he's actually four months old today and I wouldn't give him up for the world," says Trisha.

So you could say Nathan is 14 years and 4 months old and an inspiration to his mother.

"I'm going to start my own business for people that need to have that closure of trying to have a child and can't," adds Trisha.

Only five clinics in the country perform frozen embryo transfers...the fertilized, frozen eggs can last 20 years.
